Reporting accidents and ill health at work is a legal requirement. This information enables the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) and local authorities to identify where and how risks arise, and to investigate serious accidents. This then helps to provide advice on how to reduce injury, and ill health in the workplace. For most businesses, a reportable accident, dangerous occurrence, or case of disease is a comparatively rare event however if it does happen it should be reported.
